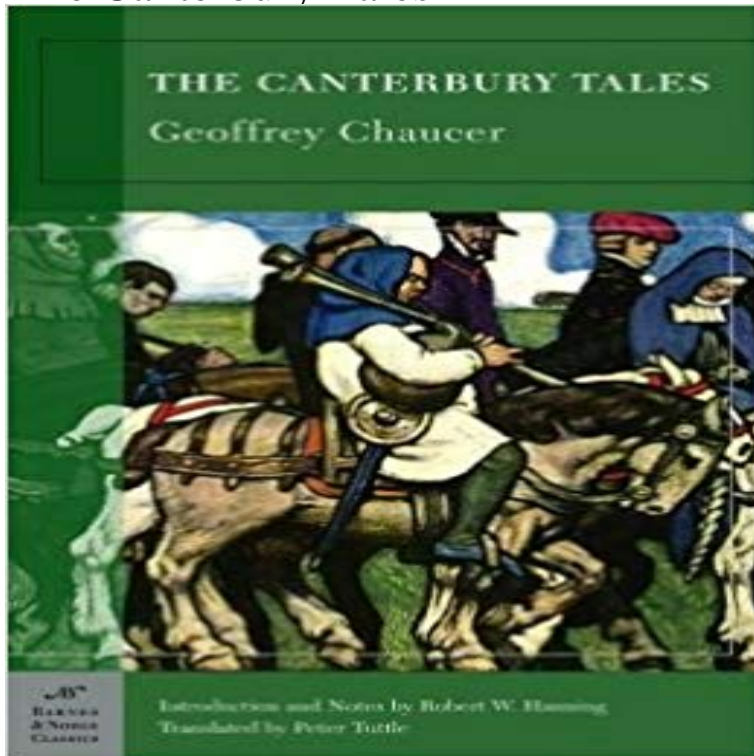


The Canterbury Tales
